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Overview

The Department of Theatre and Dance offers BA and BFA degrees in dance. Prospective majors should audition and meet with undergraduate advisor as early as possible. All dance courses have reading and writing requirements, attendance requirements, dance concert attendance requirements, and practical examinations. An audition is required for acceptance into the program.

For transfer students, course requirements may be adjusted based on placement auditions. If lower-level courses are waived, additional courses may be assigned. This policy applies to all majors.

About our Faculty

The dance faculty is intensely involved in a wide range of dance and theatre-related activities extending beyond the campus, including:

American College Dance Festival Association, the Joffrey Ballet, National Dance Education Organization/NYSDEA, Philadanco, the Western New York Institute for Arts in Education, choreography for state Miss America pageants, Greater Buffalo Opera, Irish Classical Theatre, Lehrerdance, Moving Miracles, Shakespeare in the Park, MusicalFair, Studio Arena, the Buffalo Academy for the Visual and Performing Arts, and master classes and workshops across the country and abroad. The faculty's multifaceted activities have won the program widespread recognition.

The UB Center for the Arts is the home of the National Dance Masters of America Teachers' Training School and has the distinct honor of having hosted the Jazz Dance World Congress for three unprecedented years: 1999, 2000, and 2003.

About our Facilities

The \$50 million Center for the Arts benefits UB students directly through outstanding public performance and exhibition facilities. The center houses the Departments of Art, Media Study, and Theatre & Dance, showcasing both academic and public presentations of the arts in its many intriguing and interdisciplinary forms. The Department of Music is housed in adjacent Slee and Baird Halls, allowing music students to also discover a genuine intermingling of the arts.

Theatre and dance students have a variety of theatres and studios in which to work and learn. The range and complexity of theatre spaces allow students great versatility in their professional preparation. Supporting this effort are excellent shop facilities for costumes, scenery, properties, paint, and makeup.

The 400-seat Drama Theatre is intimate, with inviting decor and technical advantages that make it ideally suited to theatre and dance department productions and chamber operas. The orchestra pit can accommodate approximately forty musicians.

Mainstage is an 1,800-seat theatre that houses the majority of the professional touring companies at the Center for the Arts. Other features include a custom-built orchestra shell, allowing stage concerts to take place without the need for microphones and speakers. Computer-controlled panels on the walls of the auditorium are designed to adjust the acoustics at the touch of a button.

Also available to UB arts students are twin black box theatres that allow almost any kind of theatrical presentation, especially multimedia and experimental works. A 200-seat media study screening room can be used for departmental programming, as well as for the public presentation of films, speakers, panel discussions, poetry readings, and press conferences.

Dance studios are spacious with Marley flooring over maple-sprung wood floors engineered for maximum resiliency, twelve-foot mirrors, upper-level observation spaces, and specially designed sound systems.

Locally, the students of theatre and dance enjoy a working relationship with Alleyway Theatre, Artpark, Buffalo United Artists, Irish Classical Theatre Co., Buffalo City Ballet, Buffalo Contemporary Dance Co., LeherDance, MusicalFare, Shakespeare in Delaware Park, Studio Arena Theatre, Theatre of Youth, and Western New York affiliated Dance Masters of America dance establishments. Studio Arena is a LORT theatre located in the heart of the theatre district in downtown Buffalo.

Dancers Workshop is a student organization that offers non-credit performing and related opportunities to the university community at various levels of ability and interest. Workshop advisers are members of the dance faculty.

The Guild

The Guild is managed entirely by students. It hosts opening night receptions, is the liaison among department faculty, staff, and students, and produces evenings of new works by students.

Emerging Choreographers Showcase is faculty directed/mentored. Advanced-level student choreographers are invited by the faculty to present concerts of their works.

Zodiaque Dance Company

The Zodiaque Dance Company is a performance training company that requires a major time commitment. Membership for the year is by audition early each fall.

Zodiaque Studio Dance Ensemble

The Ensemble is a performance training company with a fall semester commitment.

Practical Experience and Special Academic Opportunities

Notable Program Features

The Department of Theatre and Dance offers BA and BFA degree programs in which students may study a broad range of production, design, technology, performance, historical, and literary aspects of theatre, dance, and music theatre. A central curriculum of courses is shared by all theatre, dance, and music theatre majors from which students go on to pursue separate majors in theatre, dance, music theatre, or theatre and dance areas. Auditions are required for entrance into the BA Dance and all BFA programs.

Department classes balance scholarship and practical training. In theatre, there is a full sequence of courses in theatre technology and design, acting, playwriting, directing, and history and literature. In dance, there is a full sequence of courses in jazz, ballet, contemporary dance, tap, choreography, teaching methods, history and research.

Performances and productions are essential parts of the curriculum, providing hands-on learning experiences. There are four performance spaces in the Center for the Arts: the Drama Theatre with 400 seats and the 1800 seat Main Stage, and two multipurpose black box spaces. The Katharine Cornell Theatre provides added dimensions to performance opportunities for student directed productions. The department's Zodiaque Dance Company and Zodiaque Studio Dance Ensemble perform at the university and present in the community; membership is by audition held at the beginning of the fall semester. Emerging Choreographer's Showcase, features the work of upper level student choreographers, mentored by the dance faculty.

The theatre and music theatre programs both offer one major proscenium production and one black box production each year. Recent works include: Merrily We Roll Along, A Winter's Tale, The Trial, The Good Women of Szechuan, Steel Pier, Spinning into Butter. These performance opportunities are augmented by classroom projects that culminate in a performance at the end of each semester, as well as "Poor Theatre." directed by the faculty.

Dancers Workshop, a student-run organization, also generates a production annually. Workshop advisors are members of the faculty. The GUILD, a student theatre and dance organization, acts as a liaison between students and faculty, and generates performances through Proba, a student run production company for workshop productions.

Students may shape the courses that complete the requirements for the B.A. major by following sequences in such areas as general dance studies, music theatre, dance performance, theatre performance, choreography, design/technology, dance education, playwriting, directing, history, and literature.

Students in dance work with nationally and internationally known guest faculty, directors, and choreographers in yearly residencies with the UB Center for the Arts. Annual residencies have included: American Ballet Studio Co., Bill T. Jones/Arnie Zane Dance Co., Doug Varone and Dancers, Gus Giordano Jazz Dance Chicago, Jump Rhythm Jazz, Jose Limon, Taylor 2 Co, Elisa Monte, and Urban Bush Women.

Auditions are required for all dance and music theatre majors.

Undergraduate Research and Practical Experience

Internships

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Internships in dance teaching are available. The Department of Theatre & Dance encourages students to seek out this opportunity, and expects it of majors. A partnership with Moving Miracles Dance Studio, a dance/movement program for children, adolescents and adults who are exceptionally challenged mentally, physically and/or emotionally, places qualified dance majors in teaching residencies. Students interested in pilates may apply for an internship.

Scholarships

Performing and Creative Arts Scholarships are available through the University Honors College. Auditions are required for applicants. To qualify for consideration, students must have a minimum high school average of 90 percent and a combined SAT score of at least 1230 or ACT score of 28. Transfer honors applicants must hold a minimum GPA of 3.8. The Perry Watkins scholarship is available to African American freshman students majoring in design/technology. Presidential Gala Scholarship for Dance, granted to an incoming dance major. Auditions, portfolios, and a personal interview are required for all scholarship students.

Teaches the fundamentals of tap dance, including basic rhythmic structure and incorporation of dance fundamentals, such as alignment and style, in conjunction with tap technique.

THD 213: Ballet 1

Credits: 2 Semester(s): Fall Type: LEC

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Teaches the fundamentals of ballet technique, including correct body alignment, basic barre and center work, and combinations at the elementary level.

THD 214: Ballet 2

Credits: 2

Semester(s): Spring Pre-requisites: <u>THD 213</u>

Type: LEC

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Teaches the fundamentals of ballet technique, including correct body alignment, basic barre and center work, and combinations at the elementary level.

THD 229: Tutorials in Dance

Credits: 1-4 Type: LAB

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

For students who require additional study in a particular area.

THD 263: Jazz Dance 1

Credits: 2 Semester(s): Fall Type: LEC

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Presents jazz forms, including barre and center work emphasizing these forms' relationships to lineage-based societies, as well as to classical, contemporary, rock, and popular dance.

THD 264: Jazz Dance 2

Credits: 2

Semester(s): Spring
Pre-requisites: THD 263

Type: LEC

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The University Grade Repeat Policy does not apply.

Presents jazz forms, including barre and center work emphasizing these forms' relationships to lineage-based societies, as well as to classical, contemporary, rock, and popular dance.

THD 279: Tutorials in Dance

Credits: 1-4 Type: LAB

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

For students who require additional study in a particular area.

THD 302: Beginning Pointe

Credits: 1

Semester(s): Spring

Type: SEM

An extension of ballet study using a pointe shoes. Introduces correct placement and use of the foot en pointe.

THD 310: Tap 3

Credits: 3 Semester(s): Fall Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Expands the tap dancer's movement, vocabulary, and historical understanding of this dance form. Emphasizes in particular the aural, visual, and expressive elements of tap dance.

THD 311: Tap 4

Credits: 3

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Semester(s): Spring Pre-requisites: <u>THD 310</u>

Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Expands the tap dancer's movement, vocabulary, and historical understanding of this dance form. Emphasizes in particular the aural, visual, and expressive elements of tap dance.

THD 315: Dance Improvisation

Credits: 2

Pre-requisites: THD 202

Type: SEM

Investigates solo and group movement improvisation through the use of improvisational structures and sensory experiences. Includes historical context and improvisational theory. Equal emphasis is placed on improvisation for movement invention and improvisation as a performance device and choreographic form.

THD 341: Ballet 3

Credits: 3 Semester(s): Fall Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 213-THD 214</u>. Extends technical and artistic ballet skills through increasingly complex combinations, introduces technical vocabulary, and emphasizes style and presentation.

THD 342: Ballet 4

Credits: 3

Semester(s): Spring Pre-requisites: THD 341

Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 213-THD 214</u>. Extends technical and artistic ballet skills through increasingly complex combinations, introduces technical vocabulary, and emphasizes style and presentation.

THD 345: Modern Dance 3

Credits: 3 Semester(s): Fall Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 201-THD 202</u>. Expands technique and theory through increasingly complex combinations and movement analysis, and introduces new technical vocabulary, style, and presentation.

THD 346: Modern Dance 4

Credits: 3

Semester(s): Spring Pre-requisites: <u>THD 345</u>

Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 201-THD 202</u>. Expands technique and theory through increasingly complex combinations and movement analysis, and introduces new technical vocabulary, style, and presentation.

THD 350: Introduction to Laban Movement Analysis

Credits: 3
Type: LEC

Provides an introduction to Rudolf Laban's system of observation, description, and analysis of movement, and to Irmgard Bartenieff's system of body re-education for developing techniques that enhance movement efficiently, body connectivity, and expressivity.

THD 367: Tutorials in Dance

Credits: 1-4 Type: LAB

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

For students who require additional study in a particular area.

THD 371: Jazz Dance 3

Credits: 3 Semester(s): Fall Pre-requisites: THD 264

Type: LEC

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of THD 263-THD 264. Expands the jazz dancer's movement and performance vocabulary. Emphasizes classic jazz style and technique and its relationship to established musical jazz styles. Focuses heavily on classic Matt Mattox technique, combining neuromuscular coordination with warm-ups, locomotor skills, and combination work.

THD 372: Jazz Dance 4

Credits: 3

Semester(s): Spring

Type: LEC

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 263</u> - <u>THD 264</u>. Expands the jazz dancer's movement and performance vocabulary. Emphasizes classic jazz style and technique and its relationship to established musical jazz styles. Focuses heavily on classic Matt Mattox technique,

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combining neuromuscular coordination with warm-ups, locomotor skills, and combination work.

THD 378: Pas De Deux 1

Credits: 1 Semester(s): Fall Pre-requisites: THD 342

Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Studies partnering through classical and contemporary pas de deux. Emphasizes technical and dramatic aspects of partnering, rhythm, breathing, correct placement, timing, projection, counterbalancing the movements of a partner, and developing dramatic content through movement using gesturing and line.

THD 379: Pas De Deux 2

Credits: 1 Semester(s): Fall Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Studies partnering through classical and contemporary pas de deux. Emphasizes technical and dramatic aspects of partnering, rhythm, breathing, correct placement, timing, projection, counterbalancing the movements of a partner, and developing dramatic content through movement using gesturing and line.

THD 381: Social Dance Forms 1

Credits: 3
Semester(s): Spring
Type: SEM

Covers the history and performance of approximately fourteen early and contemporary social dances, including the pavane, galliard, minuet, waltz, foxtrot, swing, tango, and Latin Caribbean dances.

THD 382: Social Dance Forms 2

Credits: 3

Semester(s): Spring Type: SEM

Covers the history and performance of approximately fourteen early and contemporary social dances, including the pavane, galliard, minuet, waltz, foxtrot, swing, tango, and Latin Caribbean dances.

THD 385: The Male Dancer

Credits: 1 Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Studies the role of the male in dance. Includes character interpretation, upper body strength, elevation, pirouettes, and

variations from the male dance repertory.

THD 400: Creative Movement

Credits: 3

Semester(s): Spring Type: SEM

Explores creative problem solving, mind-body integration, and the creative process through movement using simple to increasingly complex individual and group exercises. Prerequisite for THD 441.

THD 407: Tap 5

Credits: 3 Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Extends the tap dancer's movement vocabulary. Integrates tap exercises and combinations with other dance forms, such as ballet, jazz, and modern dance. Emphasizes technique and performance.

THD 408: Tap 6

Credits: 3 Type: SEM

Extends the tap dancer's movement vocabulary. Integrates tap exercises and combinations with other dance forms, such as ballet, jazz, and modern dance. Emphasizes technique and performance.

THD 411: Modern Dance 6

Credits: 3

Semester(s): Spring
Pre-requisites: THD 410

Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 345-THD 346</u>. Studies technique and style of increased difficulty and variety in combinations of extended length, and pays attention to precision of performance and projection.

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THD 417: Jazz Dance 5

Credits: 3 Semester(s): Fall Pre-requisites: THD 372

Type: LEC

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 371-THD 372</u>. Studies technique and style of increased complexity, and pays attention to technical precision, performance, and stylistic execution.

THD 418: Jazz Dance 6

Credits: 3

Semester(s): Spring

Type: LEC

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 371-THD 372</u>. Studies technique and style of increased complexity, and pays attention to technical precision, performance, and stylistic execution.

THD 421: Ballet 5

Credits: 3

Semester(s): Spring Pre-requisites: <u>THD 342</u>

Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 342</u>. Studies technique of increased difficulty, variety, and complexity, and pays attention to precision of execution, performance, and style.

THD 422: Ballet 6

Credits: 3

Semester(s): Spring Pre-requisites: THD 421

Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

A continuation of <u>THD 342</u>. Studies technique of increased difficulty, variety, and complexity, and pays attention to precision of execution, performance, and style.

THD 441: Choreography 1

Credits: 4

Pre-requisites: THD 400

Type: SEM

Explores the process of making dances. Studies the elements of dance composition, including the development of solo and group studies for class presentation.

THD 454: Teaching Methods in Dance

Credits: 3 Type: SEM

For upper-level dance students interested in expanding their knowledge and practical experience in preparation for a career in the field of dance education. Includes lesson plan development, injury prevention, and experience in practical teaching situations.

THD 455: Special Topics in Dance

Credits: 1-4 Type: SEM

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Topics vary by semester.

THD 479: Tutorials in Dance

Credits: 1-4 Type: TUT

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

For students who require additional study in a particular area.

THD 496: Internship - Dance Teaching

Credits: 1-3 Type: TUT

Gives qualified students experience as teaching assistants or teaching interns.

THD 499: Independent Study

Credits: 1-4 Type: TUT

The content of this course is variable and therefore it is repeatable for credit. The <u>University Grade Repeat Policy</u> does not apply.

Involves independent study at the undergraduate level.
